The National Executive Committee may

The Education Program promotes the American Legion Auxiliary's role in providing quality education for children and adults through classroom activities, literacy programs, scholarship promotion and support of education beyond high school, especially for military children.

Things that your unit can do to promote the Education Program: Enhance respect for the sacrifices of our military heroes among school children by scheduling Veterans in the Classroom programs at local schools. Promote American Legion Auxiliary scholarships and award local scholarships at the Department and unit levels.

Your unit Education Chairman should contact your school guidance counselor or teacher who handles scholarship opportunities. Make copies of any scholarship applications (unit, department and national) and provide them to the schools. Please refer to the application rules and deadlines.

Form a scholarship selection committee. Send your scholarship winners for department and national scholarships to the Department Education Chairman. Publicize the winners of ALA scholarships at a school presentation and in the medial

Spirit of Youth Scholarship - One Junior Member in each division will receive \$1250 per year for four years (\$5000). The applicant must be a member of the Auxiliary for three years and continue her membership during the four-year scholarship period.

Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation

by Teresa Huntimer, VA & R Chairman The Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation program promotes our mission to enhance the lives of U.S. veterans, military and their families. Since World War 1, the American Legion Auxiliary have taken an active role in the care and rehabilitation of veterans. It wasn't until 1930 that the care and rehabilitation for veterans were integrated under a unified Veterans Affairs program similar to what we know today.

As it stands today, under the direction of the ALA's Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation Program, members serve as VAVS volunteers and as Service to Veterans volunteers. VAVS volunteers must serve in a VA healthcare facility, whereas Serve to Veterans volunteer can serve from their homes or in the community with other service organizations.

You may earn a pin for 50 hours of service and hour bars to add to your pin. Record service hours and value of any expense donations made in service and submit them to the unit VA &R chairman, then district, then department.

This month on November 11, we honor our veterans. As American citizens, we owe everything to those men and women who heroically sacrificed so much, and sometimes everything to preserve our nation's freedoms. This is why our nation celebrates Veterans Day, and why the American Legion Auxiliary works hard for our veterans every day. It's vital that we do all we can to honor the memory of those missing in action, those veterans who have perished, those who remain in service, and those who made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of our nation.

As a member of the American Legion Auxiliary, every day is a time of remembrance for me. It's such a small thing we ask of ourselves, just this one day of the year, to honor our veterans for such a huge gift they have given to us- Our Freedom.
